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# A Little Bit of Centennial History


In 1923 as Carmichael Community Church was officially established, Carmichael Grammar School on Sutter Ave, was its home. The trustees of the Carmichael School District considered the usage of the school for a place of worship as a perfectly logical use of the facility. In fact, the school played the critical role of a community center. As the school grew from a single

two-room building to double its size, the enrollment of the church grew as well. In 1923 almost 90 people attended church, and the Sunday School had 134 kids. All four rooms of the school and an outbuilding called the music room were fully utilized on a Sunday morning. For the first time since its formation the church began to consider building its own permanent place of worship.

True to Presbyterian form, a committee was formed to spend untold amounts of hours examining the issues. By the following December \$2,500.00 was in the building fund and an architect was commissioned to draw up a blueprint for a building that

would be approximately 28 feet by 50 feet in size.

With plans in place, it was time to find a site for this new church. Not without contro-

versy, the Church Building Committee waited almost two years before selecting the final site. Three different properties had been proposed, with each site favoring a different section of Carmichael. The first site was a half-acre of land beside a filling station located at the bend of Fair Oaks Highway. The second site was a piece of property offered by Mrs. Warren on Palm Drive. The third property was the property of Mr. H. A. Hobbs on Marconi Ave. 1926 had seen the paving of Marconi Avenue. One can only imagine that paved roads might have helped the committee move forward on a decision. The *San Juan Record* reported that Hobbs donated the land

on May 11, 1927. Hobbs offered the site, the lot occupied by the present church building on Marconi Avenue, as a gift with the privilege of purchase of (the) adjoining lot on the

west. The church accepted the offer.

Legend has it, when Mr. Hobbs presented the land to the church, he said, "I haven't been able to make a thing grow

on this piece, but maybe a church will grow there." Pastor Jim Clark received a letter in 1992 from Hobbs's niece, Betty, reaffirming that statement. She said, "I can remember hearing many times that Uncle Henry donated that land to God's work since he could never get it to 'work' for him." Call it a legend or call it fact; legend became truth as God's work started to grow at 5645 Marconi Avenue for Carmichael Community Church in 1927 and has flourished for nearly 100 years.

# Extending God's Love to Those in Crisis

We live in an action-oriented culture. The emphasis is on *doing*, and when a problem occurs, we want to *solve* it as quickly as possible. Unfortunately, there is usually

no quick fix for the painful and complex problems people experience. In actual fact, while you may want to help, you are not obligated to *solve* the crisis that overwhelms another person.

The best way you can help is by being there in supportive ways that help mobilize the person's own resources and faith to cope with whatever is happening.

But how do you do that? How do you learn the skills that encourage a person embroiled in a personal crisis to work through and overcome the crisis by him or herself? Here's the good news: the skills needed are all taught in the Stephen Minister training. This training equips Stephen Ministers to offer confidential, one-to-one ministry to hurting individuals. As caring Lay Ministers, they have responded to Christ's call to "*carry each other's burdens, and in this way*

*you will fulfill the law of Christ.*" (Gal. 6:2) All anyone needs to bring to the training is a compassionate heart, a willingness to learn, an honest desire to respect and under-

stand others, and faith in God.

The Christian faith is centered on the fact that God's grace and love are expressed in human relationships.

Those who respond to God's love and accept the responsibility to carry that same love to others who need it, extend the presence and availability of God's love in a hurting world. Stephen Ministers do that by meeting weekly with their care receiver to encourage, pray with and for them, and listen empathetically and nonjudgmentally to whatever

that person wants to share with them. The Stephen Minister is not there to solve the care receiver's problems, yet together with God's help, the individual usually finds ways to move forward toward healing and wholeness.

Please prayerfully consider joining other caring members of CPC to be trained as a Stephen Minister and learn how to extend the love of Christ to those who are experiencing a difficult time. As another incentive, those taking the training also enrich their own interpersonal communication skills, which helps in their own family and work relationships. We hope to have a new Stephen Ministry training class this fall if enough people are interested. The first graduation was held in the Courtyard outside the Gathering Place, and the second, due to high heat, was held in McMullen Hall.

Both graduations were joyous events with each woman singled out for recognition of her accomplishments. Many moms brought their children, and CPC provided paper and crayons to keep the little ones occupied during the celebrations. World Relief and the graduates provided lunch, and there was a special cake with every graduate's name on it!

After the second graduation, **Heidi Guttschuss**, the World Relief Sacramento education director, shared a heartfelt thank you: "Graduation went SOOOOO well! 
