From Pastor Keith L. DeVries: "Planting Seeds of Faith"

Spring is such a wonderful season of new life, where the temperature gets warmer, plants begin to grow, you spend more time outdoors (thank you Daylight Saving Time), and you have more opportunities to enjoy God's good creation all around us. The other day, my wife, Jenny, pointed out to me some flowers that were growing in our fallow garden area (with the addition of a puppy to our household last year, we were reluctant to invest time and money in attempting to grow vegetables, so the bed has remained fallow, mostly...). When I asked Jenny about what was growing in our garden, she said "Someone gave us a package of wildflowers. I planted them in September rather hastily. I spread them out and covered them with about a ½ inch of dirt and then I watered them one time. It had been a hot fall, so I didn't think they would take hold. So, when we had eight flowers growing at the end of February, I was amazed!" And as you can see by the pictures. something did grow!

From year to year, we don't know whether the seeds we plant will grow and flourish. In the past, when we tried to have a vegetable garden, it seemed like only every other year would the seeds and/or seed-

lings actually become a garden. But, even with our less than overwhelming success, we kept on trying. We kept on applying

fertilizer, kept on adding nutrient enriched soils, kept on watering, and kept on hoping that the local rat population wouldn't enjoy the fruit of our labors before we did.

One of the ways that we plant a garden at CPC is through our participation in the Planting Seeds of Faith auction

and lunch, which is scheduled for April 28. Over the past twenty auctions that we have held, we have planted a pletho-

> ra of seeds, by supporting financially three important areas of our ministry with children and vouth: Vacation Bible School, summer camp scholarships, and mission trips. These auction events have made it possible to offer Vacation Bible School to thousands of children, provide camp scholarships to hundreds of kids, and take hundreds of youths on mission trips far and near. Because of your generosity and support, we have raised over \$400,000 dollars in over two decades of auctions. All of your efforts and generosity and gifts to the auction have planted the seeds of faith in our children and youth so that they might claim the good news of God's love planted within them. Thank

you for your ongoing support of this event and for continuing to plant of seeds of faith for future generations, in the sure and certain knowledge that God will provide the growth in God's garden of faith.

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From Pastor Ivan N. Herman:

"Loneliness and Zoom"

Zoom is bad for my health. That's the conclusion I've come to in the four years since the dawn of the COVID pandemic. Don't get me wrong, I'm no luddite, and I think Zoom video conferencing is a fine tool for

getting business done.

It is convenient to attend virtual meetings in my pajama pants, and not having to drive to church for a division meeting, or to another city for a presbytery meeting, or to fly to another state for a Presbyterian Peace Fellowship meeting.

I love meetings, unfortunately. But it's not the subject matter or the decision-making process I like - it's being with people that I love. It is the stories, laughter, and tears we share that make meeting to-

gether a valuable exercise. Virtual meetings are second-best alternatives, and while there are practices that can help foster connections in a virtual space. there is no way to replace the dozens of personal interactions that come with meeting face-toface.

Interconnectedness and interdependence is integral to understanding the presence of the holy and divine. We mediate God for one another. Rosemarie Freeney Harding, in *Remnants:*

"Virtual meetings are second-best alternatives, and while there are practices that can help foster connections in a virtual space, there is no way to replace the dozens of personal interactions that come with meeting face-to-face.

> A Memoir of Spirit, Activism, and Mothering (Duke University Press 2015), says "that at the most fundamental and the most transcendent levels of our experience as human beings... there is always accompaniment." "We are all part of one another..." It

has long been believed that interconnectedness as human beings is what drives our spirituality and our social activism.

There is also growing evidence and scientific literature to indicate that interconnectedness

benefits our physical health,

and our growing disconnectedness and isolation is detrimental to both our mental and physical health. In May 2023, U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy released a report titled, "Our Epidemic of Loneliness and Isolation." The study found that lack of connection increases the risk of premature death to levels comparable to smoking 15 cigarettes a day! The physical consequences of poor social connection include a 29% increased risk of heart disease; a 32% increased risk of stroke; and a 50% increased risk of developing dementia. The

problem is particularly pronounced among teens and young adults, who had 70% less social interaction with their friends than was common just two decades ago. The quantity of social interactions (views, likes, clicks) through social me-

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Children of God

"You are all children of God through faith in Christ Jesus.

For all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ.

There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."
(Galatians 3:26-28)

These are powerful words of welcome and oneness for all believers of Jesus! We are called to see every person (ourselves included!) as being made in God's image. When we remember that we are called by Jesus to see others as our "neighbor" and to love them as ourselves. we are called to help wherever we can. Today's world can feel overwhelming with the suffering we see around us: those threatened by war and violence, those living with poverty, the unhoused, the hostility among polarized groups, to name a few. It may be challenging to see how we could possibly bring the needed help and relief to those who are suffering in this wounded world. And yet, if we each do something, much can be accomplished! One small thing we each can do is to educate ourselves about the resources and possibilities that are available. We can be a welcoming face to everyone we

meet, listen empathetically to those who need to share their difficulties, and reach out to include those who otherwise may



not feel included.

"Thus says the Lord GOD, who gathers the outcasts of Israel.

I will gather others to them besides those already gathered."

(Isaiah 56:8)

We know that God promises to always be with us, to love us no matter how life and others treat us. However, other people may not understand how that could be true for them or can't see how they can continue with their situation as it is.

If we realize that a colleague, friend, or family member is struggling with challenging dif-

ficulties, and they need someone to talk to, someone who will listen with confidentiality, we can tell them about Stephen Ministry. This ministry is an extension of pastoral care allowing compassionate Christian care to be given weekly, one-to-one for as long as the person needs it. Stephen Ministers do not fix the person's problems. Stephen Ministry training allows them to listen empathetically without judgment, to be a sounding board when needed. to help the person discern what is under their control to change, so they can move forward to meet their goals.

we learned about the first Palm Sunday.


